

# LENT COURSE



Led by Ian and his wife, Vicki, this year's *River Through the Desert* Lent Course, from St George's College in Jerusalem, started last Thursday. Stephanie kindly agreed to write about it:

Can you tell us more about the Lent course? This year's lent course is a 5 week course journeying through the Holy Land whilst reflecting on various themes. There is a short text given in advance, a bible reading and a short film from the Holy Land followed by questions devised to encourage discussion. The first week took us to the desert where Jesus was tormented by the devil.

What did you enjoy most about it? In the current climate, this might be the closest I get to the Holy Land so it was really nice to be able to see the desert where Jesus was tormented. It's also nice to have a visual as the desert was very different from what I imagined.

What was your take away? The session was focused around the desert traditionally seen as a place of isolation and wilderness and encouraged us to look at where we go when we want solitude and how we deal with it.

What are you most looking forward to? I'm looking forward to 'travelling' to the other parts of the Holy Land and places that Jesus visited.

#### **40 DAYS WITH GOD'S CREATURES**

The '40 Days with God's Creature' is another Lent resource which we have shared. Richard tells us more about it here:

I suspect it is unlikely that you've given up on your Lent fast of choice yet; it might be, however, that you never quite got started. So let me give one last nudge to the app I am using this year: 40 Days with God's Creatures (available in all the usual places).

Forget about focusing on slightly abstract spiritual disciplines and allow this app to earth your Lent in the created world around you as you use it to explore what the Christian faith has to say about animals. It might not be a subject that you'd expect to explore in the 40 days following Ash Wednesday but that's why this is so good: it is a refreshing change from the old routine. And because it is in the form of an app, there are links to TED talks, Pixar animations and Youtube music videos as well which really enrich the short, daily section of text to read.

I am not sure where it will finally end up come Easter but I am enjoying the journey so far and being helped to think about God's world differently.

**How could we pray for you?** I think you could pray that students are able to get used to being back at school quickly and that teachers will be kind as we adjust to the new circumstances.
