I want all of us to see this year as a year of invitation - a year when I will keep inviting you to join in with whatever we are doing as church, and also, a year to keep encouraging you to invite others to come and join in with what's going on, too. UNCLE RICHARDS' EULOGY

Uncle Richards' funeral was held in St Barnabas on Friday 14 January. Family members, friends and neighbours gathered for a last farewell. Among the many tributes, Gen and Madge, Uncle Richards' daughters, delivered the Eulogy and Merlena spoke on behalf of St Barnabas Church.

EULOGY



Mr Zephaniah Richards was born on 3rd March 1925 in Saint Catherine's Jamaica to Otis and Victoria Richards. He was the eldest of seven children. Otis Richards passed away when our dad was 14 years old so he had to leave school to help his mum with the family business: sugar cane

cane, citrus and many other produce. Dad later worked for King Cade Dispensary in Kingston, Jamaica.

He was known to be the greatest dancer in his district in Jamaica. He won several ballroom dances. He loved Soca, Calypso, Reggae, and Rock and Roll and could dance to them all. Whenever he went to a dancehall no one would start dancing unless he came there, especially the women. Our dad later married and had four children; Gen, Madge, Bobby (who is deceased), and Franklin Richards. He also had 19 grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

In 1955 our dad migrated to England. He also helped various fellow Jamaican families migrate to England and get jobs and housing. Our Dad held various jobs such as an electrician and welder. He was the Wilson Electric Trainer for several years before retiring at the age of 65. He returned to school at the age of 53 to complete a Motor Mechanic course in order to fix his own car.

In 1966, our Dad bought the house at 151 Mallinson Rd where he lived until he passed away on 29th of December 2021. Over the years he developed great friendships with his neighbours. His relationship goes back three generations. He loved all people young, old and all races. For example, his neighbour's children, Finn and Frank would visit him regularly after school for tea and would tell him about that day. He taught them to do a gentleman handshake.

Mr Zephaniah Richards, fondly known as "Uncle Richard", attended St. Barnabas church when he was come where he was confirmed several years ago. He was not able to attend church during the last few years however, he loved the visit from the Vicars of the church and church members who often popped around for a cup of tea.

Our Dad lost his first son, Bobby, in 2006 which was very stressful to him. However, he overcame that sadness and took on the responsibility of loving and caring for Bobby's children as if they were his own. They often refer to him as the second dad.

Our dad was such a loving, kind, patient and wise man. He often said my name Zephaniah means Prophet. He was the patriarch of how family. His children and grandchildren looked up to him for inspiration and knowledge. Whenever we all call him for various issues he would love to say "Look on the bright side of life and everything will be OK". He encouraged his family and friends to go for their dreams.

Our Dad was also a world traveller. He loved to tell us of these various trips to Paris, Spain, Canada and USA.

Our dad would like for the family and friends to keep his memory alive by continuing to listen to reggae and gospel music, and to make his famous Curry goat and sorrel drink and tell the younger generation of the stories of his life.

Merlena gave a very touching tribute on behalf of St Barnabas and spoke from her heart, without notes. This is a small summary of what she shared.

As soon as Mr Richards started to come to St Barnabas, he became known as "Uncle" Richards to all of us. After the service, he would love to go and sit on one of the chairs in the Claris Hall and have a cup of tea. If you ever asked him, 'Would you like a cup of tea?' he would always say yes, and by the time you would be back, he would be sitting and chatting with someone.

When he was no longer able to come to St Barnabas, the vicars and others from the pastoral team started to visit him at home. I used to visit him at home. There was always a cup of tea and lots of stories, stories from Jamaica and stories from England.

We used to talk about a lot of things. He loved partying and we used to remember the parties we attended when we were younger.



He was very easy to speak to and he loved to talk to people. He was nice and wise, he talked sense. He was part of the St Barnabas family and we would like to extend our sympathy to Uncle Richard's family.
