THE ADVENT ANTIPHONS

An antiphon is a short chant in Christian ritual, sung like a refrain in a song. Antiphons were written with pieces of the Psalms and other verses from the Hebrew Scriptures. They also express deep theological convictions.

The singing of antiphons (started in early Christianity by the end of the 5th century) had its root in the Synagogue. Early Christians borrowed the Jewish traditions of chanting psalms and singing hymns together.

The regular, liturgical function of the Advent Antiphons (also commonly called the *O Antiphons*) is as the chant sung or recited at the beginning and end of the Magnificat during the service of Evening Prayer on each of the days leading up to Christmas Day, from 17-23 December.
